Aim of Course	<p>This course contains Elementary and Pre-Intermediate levels of English. The aim of this course in Elementary level is to teach students vocabulary and grammar content as well as expressions used in their daily life, and to enable them to communicate about basic topics in Elementary level.</p> <p>The aim of this course in Pre-Intermediate level is to teach students vocabulary and grammar content as well as expressions used in their social environment, and to enable them to communicate about personal topics as well as areas of interest.</p> <p>The aim of this course in Intermediate level to maintain interaction and get across what they want to express in a range of contexts and follow the main points of extended discussion around them, provided that speech is clearly articulated in standard dialect.</p> <p>The aim of this course in Upper-Intermediate level is to gain students the necessary skills to communicate about the main ideas of complex text on both concrete and abstract topics.</p> <p>The aim of this course in Advanced level is to teach students a broad range of language, which allows fluent, spontaneous and almost effortless communication on a great range of topics.</p>
Learning Outcomes	<p>At the end of Elementary level students will be able to;</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Understand and use everyday speech expressions and very basic expressions that are intended to meet the needs of a specific type. • Introduce himself and others, and ask and answer questions about personal information, such as where he lives, people he knows, and what he owns. • Communicate with other people in a simple way when the speech is slowly and clearly delivered and the person is ready to help. • Understand frequently used sentences and expressions (e.g. very basic person and family information, shopping, location, employment) related to areas of immediate need. • Communicate on basic and daily issues that require simple and direct exchange of information on familiar and daily issues. • Explain the description of the past, the environment and the areas that require immediate needs in simple terms. <p>At the end of Pre-Intermediate level students will be able to;</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Comprehend the basic points of standard situations such as at work, at school, at leisure, etc. that are clearly defined in familiar subjects. • Manage most of the situations that will arise when travelling in an area where this language is spoken. • Produce simple texts on familiar topics or topics on their areas of interest. • Explain their experiences, activity, dreams, hopes and ambitions, and provide short reasons and explanations about ideas and plans. <p>At the end of Intermediate level students will be able to;</p>

- understand the main points of clear standard speech on familiar matters regularly encountered in work, school, leisure, etc.
- to understand factual texts on subjects related to their interests that consist mainly of high frequency everyday or job-related language.
- exploit a wide range of simple language to deal with most situations likely to arise whilst travelling.

At the end of **Upper-Intermediate level** students will be able to;

- understand standard speech spoken at a normal rate and follow even complex lines of argument provided the topic is reasonably familiar.
- understand articles and reports concerned with contemporary problems in which the writers adopt particular stances or viewpoints.
- interact with a degree of fluency and spontaneity that makes regular interaction with native speakers quite possible.

At the end of **Advanced level** students will be able to;

- understand lectures and discussions on complex topics beyond their own field, though they may need to confirm occasional details, especially if the accent is unfamiliar.
- understand long and complex factual and literary texts, appreciating distinctions of style.
- present clear, detailed descriptions of complex subjects integrating sub-themes, developing particular points and rounding off with an appropriate conclusion.
